Councilmen's Cornerstone

As area youth and many adults prepare to graduate, the traditions of the graduation ceremony that have existed for generations will be put into practice yet again. But what exactly are the origins of all these traditions?

Pomp and Circumstance: Also known as "Land of Hope and Glory" was written by Sir Edward Elgar in 1901. The title of "Pomp and Circumstance" comes from a line in Shakespeare's Othello,

"Pride, pomp and circumstance of glorious war!" In 1902, lyrics were written by poet and essayist Arthur Christopher Benson to celebrate the crowning of King Edward the VII. It first became associated with graduation ceremonies in 1905 when Elgar received an honorary doctorate from Yale University and it was played.

Cap and Gown: The outfit that signifies a graduate is the traditional cap and gown. The use of

the graduation gown began in the 12th century. At this time no sufficient heating systems existed in universities. Therefore, scholars were forced to try and keep warm during their ceremonies. Graduates started wearing long robes with hoods to prevent being cold. Later on in that century gowns were made the official attire of academics.

Turning of the Tassel: The use of a tassel adorning a graduation cap only started in the last 40 to 50 years. The tassel was originally designed to decorate the graduates cap during the ceremony but it has come to have symbolism as well. The gesture of moving the tassel from one side of the cap to the other symbolizes the individual's movement from candidate to graduate.

As we prepare our youth for the future we must maintain and embrace the standards of educational excellence. Where possible we must seek to provide them with experiences in their career pursuit through fulfilling exposure opportunities. The town of Indian head has experienced much revitalization but there is still much work to be done. If we are to compete with other communities we must embrace those things that are native to successful communities. To yield our degree of success will require a strategic partnership between internal and external entities.

The town of Indian head is no longer an isolated municipality and we have reached continuously to our surrounding neighbors to ensure we are active in the greater Charles County family. The new farmer and flea markets and their

structures are intended to be more inviting and we have seen the citizens respond positively. On June 15th and 16th the Girl Noticed project will grace our town as a mural will be painted on the Black Box building exterior. One of our deserving residents will be included. (www.girlnoticed.org). On August 25th the third annual Big Day of Play will include a STEAM event with nearly a hundred activities for STEAM enthusiasts.

I challenge you to be involved in the vision for the next generation of Indian Head. What does Indian Head 2.0 look like? What investments must we make in ourselves while fostering external partnerships to bring about the next generation community for ourselves and our children? How do we balance moving forward through thoughtful growth while remaining rooted in the small-town values that make Indian Head such a great place to live? I thank you for entrusting me to be part of the next chapter in the town we call home. Let's get excited about what the future may bring if we are willing to work for it.

Recycling is picked up in Town every Thursday. Residents are required to have their recycling out before 7:30am on the scheduled pick up day. Examples of what can be included in your recycling and what are NOT recyclable items are listed below.

- ◆ Diapers, Tissues/Napkins
- ◆ Wood—Pallets, Stick Wood, Tree Limbs, Furniture
- ◆ Garden Hoses, Wire, Rope, Electrical Cords
- ◆ Rocks, Concrete, Dirt
- ◆ Clothing, Towels, Sheets, Curtains, Carpeting, Tarps

If you have a water or sewer emergency after hours, call 301-743-5511 and press #5 to report your emergency. On-call Town personnel will be contacted and the problem will be handled accordingly.

After hours non-emergency type problems can be reported by leaving a message on the Town Hall office number 301-743-5511. Be prepared to furnish your name, address, phone number and brief, but detailed description of the type of problem. Water cut-offs for non-payment are not considered emergencies and are only handled during Public Works regular business hours.

Town Codes

- **Burning**—No burning is allowed within the Town.
- **Animal Control**—Dogs must be kept on the owner's property unless properly restrained. The Charles County Animal Control provides animal enforcement within the Town. Call 301-932-1713 if you have a problem.
- **Abandoned or Inoperative Vehicles** are prohibited within the Town and may not be kept on the street for more than 24 hours or on private property, with certain exceptions. Call Code Enforcement at 301-743-5511 ext. 101 with any questions.
- **Property Maintenance**—Every dwelling and lot shall be kept free from trash and garbage. Weeds and grass must be cut and kept shorter than 10 inches.
- **Building Code**—The Town has an adopted building code. Any new construction or remodeling, including, but not limited to porches, fences, sheds and garages, requires inspection and a building permit from the Town.

Recycling/Yard Waste/Bulk Trash

Solid waste products such as glass jars and bottles, newspapers, plastic bottles and metal cans will be picked up at the curb every Thursday within the Town of Indian Head. Place these items in your recycling bin—no need to separate them.

Yard waste will be collected on Wednesdays, year-round, weather permitting. Grass clippings and leaves must be placed in brown paper bags or in a trash container marked "Yard Waste" and placed at curbside. Brush must be bundled and must not be any longer than four feet (4') in length. Individual pieces of brush must not be any larger than six inches (6") in diameter.

Bulk Trash can now be scheduled year-round on Wednesdays. Fee of \$50 (cash or money order **ONLY**) per flatbed truck load must be paid in advance at time of scheduling at Town Hall. All items must be curbside by 7:00am on the pre-scheduled pick-up day but not earlier than 48 hours prior to pick-up day.

Utility Rates

The Town bills for utilities on a quarterly basis. Quality on Tap Report 2017

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Quality Water Report. This report is intended to provide you with important information about your drinking water and the efforts made by the water system to provide safe drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is 3 wells which draw from the Patapsco(2) and Patuxent(1) Aquifers.

We are pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets federal and state requirements.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

The Town of Indian Head routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, **2017**. As water travels over the land or underground, it can pick up substances or contaminants such as microbes, inorganic and organic chemicals, and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPAs Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also, come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Contaminants may be found in drinking water that may cause taste, color, or odor problems. These types of problems are not necessarily causes for health concerns. For more information on taste, odor, or color of drinking water, please contact the system's business office.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have

undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We are responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but we cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

Listed below you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Avg – Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.

Parts per million (ppm) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - Picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Action Level Goal (ALG) – The level of contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. ALGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The “Maximum Allowed” (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - The “Goal”(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Level 1 Assessment – A Level 1 assessment is a study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine (if possible) why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.

SUMMERTIME FIRE SAFETY

As the weather changes with warmer temperatures and longer day light hours; we look forward to spending much needed outdoor time with family and friends during summer vacations, picnics and family gatherings and of course the 4th of July annual celebrations. Although this is intended to be a happy time, summer time also brings fires and injuries due to outdoor grilling, campsite fires and of course fireworks. The National Fire Administration reports that more than 8,000 people annually are injured by fireworks and grill fires and more than half these injuries occur during the first week of July. By following these simple safety tips, you can make your family outings, grilling experiences, and other outdoor activities safer and hopefully avoid accidents or injuries for an enjoyable summer.

Barbeque Safety Gas Grills:

Inspecting your propane gas grill prior to using for cracked, brittle or damaged hose lines can dramatically reduce your chances of experiencing a grill fire. The easiest way to do this is to spray soapy water on all the lines and connections, turn on the gas supply and if soapy bubbles appear, turn the tank off and make needed repairs. If you suspect a leak or smell an odor, **DO NOT** attempt to light your grill. Turn the cylinder valve off and do not use the grill until all required repairs can be made. When lighting the grill, open the lid, turn on the gas, if the burner does not light within 5 seconds, turn the burner off, wait 5 minutes then try again. **NEVER** use your grill indoors and keep any grill at least **10 feet** away from your house or any building. Remember to never use your grill under any structures that can catch fire. These include carports, patio covers, porches and breezeways. **NEVER** store propane gas in homes or garages since propane gas is heavier than air and a leaking cylinder would allow the gas to seep into the home.

Charcoal Grills:

NEVER burn charcoal in an enclosed facility, when charcoal is burned it produces carbon monoxide, a colorless and odorless gas that can be deadly when inhaled. Approximately 30 people die and 100 are injured as a result of breathing carbon monoxide from charcoal each year. Use only approved starter fluids designed for these grills. Never use gasoline. Never add fluid to the fire while it's burning. Position the grill well away from siding, deck rails and all other flammable/combustible materials. Never leave a burning grill unattended. Remember that the charcoal briquettes remain extremely hot even after you finish cooking. Hot coals can result in severe burns if not handled properly. Allow the coals to cool completely, approximately 24 to 48 hours prior to disposal and place all coals in a metal container. Never use a plastic container for disposal.

As a reminder to all, there is no burning of yard waste, trash and other items within the Town limits in accordance with the Town of Indian Head Ordinances. If you see someone burning; contact the Town Hall or the dial 911 and report it immediately. Barbeque grills and fire pits are permitted for use however in accordance with Maryland Fire Laws; use of barbeque grills and fire pits are not permitted on balconies in apartments and condominiums.

Fireworks:

Each July Fourth, thousands of people, most often children and teens are injured while using consumer fireworks. Despite the dangers of fireworks, few people understand the associated risks which could include, devastating burns, other injuries and even fires. The United States Fire Administration reports that each year approximately 11,000 people visit the emergency room as a result of firework related injuries. The majority of these injuries were sparklers that burn at about 1200 degrees F. In addition to the reported injuries, almost 18,000 fires were caused by fireworks in 2014 alone.

As a reminder, the following are the only legal fireworks in the state of Maryland;

- **Sparklers**
- **Fountains**
- **Wheels and spinners**

We strongly recommend ensuring you and your family's safety by attending a public fireworks display and leave them to the professionals.

Heat Related Emergencies:

Summertime activities, whether it's working in the yard, on the playing field or the construction site can be dangerous and life threatening. When performing these types of activities we need to ensure we are taking necessary precautions to ensure balance with measures that aid the body's cooling system and prevent heat-related illness. Heat-related deaths and illness are preventable yet annually many people are overcome by the extreme heat. Historically, more people in this country died from extreme heat than from hurricanes, lightning, tornadoes, floods, and earthquakes combined. In 2001 alone, 500 deaths were caused by excessive heat exposure. People suffer heat-related illness when their bodies are unable to compensate and

properly cool themselves. The body normally cools itself by sweating. However, under some conditions, sweating just isn't enough. In such cases, a person's body temperature rises rapidly. Very high body temperatures may damage the brain or other vital organs. Several factors affect the body's ability to cool itself during extremely hot weather. When the humidity is high, sweat will not evaporate as quickly, preventing the body from releasing heat quickly. Other conditions related to risk include age, obesity, fever, dehydration, heart disease, mental illness, poor circulation, sunburn, and prescription drug and alcohol use.

The following are the 3 major types of Heat Related emergencies and the signs, symptoms and first aid steps for these possible life threatening emergencies. Please remember to call 911 in the event you experience any of the following conditions to ensure you get the proper medical care needed.

Heat Cramps: Usually affect people who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture. When low salt levels develop in the muscles it can be the cause of heat cramps. Heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion. Heat cramps are muscle pains or spasms, usually in the abdomen, arms, or legs—that may occur in association with strenuous activity. If you have heart problems or are on a low sodium diet, get medical attention for heat cramps.

Heat exhaustion: A form of heat-related illness that can develop after several days of exposure to high temperatures and inadequate replacement of fluids. It is the body's response to an excessive loss of the water and salt contained in sweat. Those most prone to heat exhaustion are elderly people, people with high blood pressure, and people working or exercising in a hot environment. The skin may be cool and moist. The victim's pulse rate will be fast and weak, and breathing will be fast and shallow. If heat exhaustion is untreated, it may progress to heat stroke. Seek medical attention immediately if any of the following occurs: symptoms are severe; the victim has heart problems or high blood pressure. Help the victim cool off, and seek medical attention if symptoms worsen or last longer than one hour.

Heat Stroke: A true life threatening emergency that occurs when the body is unable to regulate its temperature. The body's temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails, and the body is unable to cool down. Body temperature may rise to 106°F or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not provided.

Summertime should be a time for fun and making happy memories. By following these simple safety rules and exercising caution when grilling, camping or outside during the hot summer months you and your family can have many safe and enjoyable summer time events. The Indian Head Vol. Fire Department and Rescue Squad would like to wish you and your family a safe and happy summer season. 

What is HHW?

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) includes household items that are toxic, flammable, corrosive, or reactive. Improper disposal of HHW can contaminate ground and surface waters, posing a direct threat to human health and the environment.



HHW events are now held year round ... January-December!

Events are **FREE OF CHARGE** to Charles County residents.

Please keep the materials in their original containers. Mark any container that does not have a readable, original label. Bring items to the collection site in cardboard boxes to ease unloading. All materials are either recycled, repurposed, neutralized, used for alternative power generation, or disposed of in accordance with state and federal law.

Did you know?

- One gallon of motor oil can contaminate 1,000,000 gallons of fresh water.
- Screens on older television sets can contain up to 10 pounds of lead.
- Medications should not be flushed down the drain. Most medicines are not removed by wastewater treatment processes or septic systems. Chemicals from dissolved medications end up polluting our waters, impacting aquatic species, and contaminating our food and water supplies.

Hazardous Waste NOT Accepted at HHW Collection Events and Recycling Centers

Ammunition	Contact the Charles County Sheriff's Office at 301-932-2222.
Asbestos-Containing Materials	Friable asbestos is prohibited from collection and drop-off services in Charles County. Friable, or loose, asbestos should only be removed and disposed of by a trained contractor. Contact the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) at 410-537-3200. Non-friable asbestos incorporated into materials such as asbestos-containing floor tiles, shingles, and siding may be included in your regular household trash. Separate your non-friable asbestos products into trash bags, double-bagging the material.
Bio/Medical Wastes	Sharps, needles, body fluids.
Commercially Generated	Commercially generated hazardous waste is strictly prohibited.
Explosives, Fireworks, and Projectile Flares	Contact the State Fire Marshal at 410-859-7152.
Latex Paint	Latex Paint is not toxic, and once solidified, it can be disposed of in your household trash..
Medications	Prescription and non-prescription drugs can be dropped off at a participating "Drug Take Back" pharmacy. The Charles County Sheriff's La Plata and Waldorf Stations accept narcotics 24 hours a day and the Charles County Sheriff's Bryans Road Station by appointment only. Liquids or syringes are not accepted.

Can it be recycled?

Many items that are not eligible for HHW collection can be recycled at one of the county's four recycling centers. The list of acceptable materials for each recycling center is listed below.
